George Wythe High School

There has been a lot of press coverage about the battle over the new George Wythe High School. I sit as Chair of the Land Use, Housing, & Transportation Committee and serve on the Planning Commission. Both bodies have been exploring the implementation of the Richmond 300 Master Plan and its future impact on our city's future. Here is a summary of the situation and position I have taken:

- 1. **Capacity vs Enrollment** the argument has been made by School Board that enrollment projections for George Wythe HS supports 1600 students. However, the current enrollment at the new feeder middle School, River City, is already at capacity at 1500 students. While projections are estimates for enrollment, build the school for a capacity that it can grow into for the next 50 years.
- 2. Operating vs. Capital Budget I fully support funding the needs of schools delivery of education in the classroom. I will continue to support the operating budget for Richmond Public Schools. School construction and maintenance is a revenue aligned debt decision that is part of our bond strategy. Our Capital Budget is a commitment to invest our revenues for the next 20-30 years. It is my elected duty to assure that investments of tax-payer dollars are spent properly.
- 3. **Tucker and Highland Springs High Schools** Henrico just built two new replacement high schools, both at a capacity larger than the former schools and both at 2000 capacity. Why then, in a city that is seeing incredible growth, would we build a replacement high school at the same capacity that exists today?
- 4. City Council vs School Board I will commit to releasing the funds to School Board tomorrow with the commitment to build the school at a capacity of 2000. I cannot support funding anything less than that for our children.
- 5. **Developments impact on Enrollment** an argument against every development project that has come before the city has been met with opposition from the potential impact on nearby school enrollment. How then, can the same people that make that argument, not support building a larger school for the same reason?
- 6. **Majority vs Unanimous** much has been said about what School Board wants, but as I have dealt with on Council previously, a majority isn't always the whole. While it can get decision made, five votes out of nine shows divide over the issue. To make a budget amendment by Council, takes six votes, which was not achieved last night. It is my hope we are able to get to a negotiated solution in the coming weeks.
- 7. **Its School's Money** in truth, it is your money. City Council must approve requests for funding as is our defined fiduciary duty. Schools only has the funding beyond state allocated funding, from City Council's approval. It is our money to invest together. There is no fight over powers, duties, or responsibilities. School Board makes funding requests that City Council decides on how to approve. Collaboration and cooperation should be the goal, not blame and finger pointing.
- 8. **George Wythe HS should already be getting built** plans for the new high school were in process of approval last year for 2000 student capacity. Then School Board decided to take over the construction process which delayed the process and then voted to build a smaller school. City Council has not delayed the plans, School Board did last year.

It is frustrating to be in a stalemate over the size/capacity of new school. Our students deserve for this process to be a straigh-forward investment in their future. For once we are not arguing about the need to invest more in our public schools, but rather how we invest in our public schools. There are so many pressing needs for our public schools that a fight over the capacity of a new building should be the easiest decision. Yet here we are. I will continue to fight for improving public schools. I commit to working with our School Board members to find a solution together that we can all support.

Civilian Review Board (CRB)

Earlier this month, the Mayor formally introduced a paper to establish a Civilian Review Board (CRB). You can read the Mayor's full proposal here. The proposal was discussed at the Public Safety Committee Meeting and Governmental Operations Committee Meeting this month and will be before Council on May 9th, for a vote.

There are currently two versions of the CRB before the Council. One is from the Task Force that was completed last year and the update from the Mayor's Office. Here is a side-by-side comparison

Our Police Officers serve an important role in our City. Throughout my career, I have participated in observing Police Academy Training, ride-a-long's with officers, and completed the "Shoot. Don't Shoot" scenario training. My support for a CRB is to create accountability for their actions when they go beyond the defined duties and powers of their position. It is my hope that we are able to find a solution that protects the rights of our residents while also supporting the job of our officers. The city offers real estate tax relief for elderly and disabled residents

Richmond, VA — The city is accepting applications and recertifications for the Tax Relief for the Elderly and Disabled program. Existing participants in the program must submit application and recertification documents by March 31, 2022 to remain in the program. New applicants must submit a full application by June 15, 2022.

Participants in the program can apply for tax relief or a tax freeze. Tax relief partially or fully exempts residents from real estate taxes, depending on their income and assets. A tax freeze

exempts residents from paying any increase in real estate taxes over the course of the threeyear period while in the program.

Tax relief or freeze runs on a three-year cycle. Participants in the second and third years must submit their recertification by March 31 annually. When the three-year cycle is complete, participants must submit a full application.

If you or a loved one is unsure of whether you should apply, recertify, or reapply call (804) 646-6015.

Eligibility

Residents are eligible for the program if, as of 2021, they:

- Are 65 years of age or older or permanently disabled;
- Own and live in their own home;
- Have an annual household income less than \$60,000;
- Have owner and spouse assets totaling less than \$350,000 (excluding the value of their home and one acre of land); and
- Are current on their real estate taxes.

Accessibility

All associated forms and instructions are available in Spanish on the Department of Finance webpage.

If you are a caretaker or loved one of an elderly or disabled Richmonder and would like to help them apply, the Department of Finance wants to empower you to do that. You can fill out the Authorized Representative Form, <u>found here</u>, or present your Power of Attorney document to enable you to apply on behalf of an individual.

The City is making an effort to promote this program directly to potentially eligible participants. If you would like to support this effort by hosting an information session, airing an interview, or distributing materials, please contact (804) 646-6015. We'd be honored to have your help.



Recycling Collection Issues & Delays

I share in your frustration and concerns about the issues with our recycling collection. CVWMA is a regional authority focused on our recycling collection efforts. This service is paramount to our City and needs to be dependable. Over the last several months there have been noted issues with consistency in collections with missed collections over many weeks. Being that recycling is only collected once every two weeks, one missed collection can have huge impacts in our community. This is unacceptable service delivery especially since we pay for this service on our monthly utility bills. I am aware of the issue and have felt its negative impact personally. We are going to work with City Leadership to find how we can address this issue as they are a separate authority and are not under the direct control of the City, however, we are a significant contributor to their operations and are working on solutions.

We have had several fires recently and protecting your home, belongings, and lives depend on functioning protection systems.

Beware of fire hazards.

Cooking, heating, electrical outlets, cigarettes, and candles are common fire hazards.

Check fire alarms.

Test smoke alarms every month. Replace the batteries every year.

Create a fire escape plan with exit points for every room in your home.

Fire prevention starts with you!

Conduct a fire drill.

Practice your fire escape plan. Know how to stop, drop, and roll.

Ask for help.

Know who to call in case of a fire. Stay calm and give them your address with landmarks.


